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Pastor's Corner

Blessings in the name of our risen Lord.

You'd miss it if you weren't paying attention. I've been a fan of Charles Dickins' "A Christmas Carol" for as long as I can remember, particularly the movies. And I used to think that I had seen them all, that is until I looked on IMDb which listed 230 versions of the story going back to 1901. I remember watching Alistair Sim as Ebenezer Scrooge in Black and White. Then there's been Albert Finney, George C. Scott, and my favorite, Patrick Stewart. There's been cartoons and take-offs of the story including, "Scrooged" with Bill Murray, "A Mickey's Christmas Carol," and who can forget "A Muppet Christmas Carol." I have friends who, as a family tradition, eat their Thanksgiving turkey, duck, or goose, and then retire to the TV room to watch "A Muppet Christmas Carol."

For all of the mentions of Christmas (even though "Christmas" is short for "Christ" "Mass," the church's celebration of the birth of Jesus), there is not a mention of Jesus in Dickens' entire story. I've got a copy of the book in electronic format and did a search for "Jesus" and "Christ" and found zero instances. The birth of Jesus is not the point of Dickens' story. But in the movies, Jesus sneaks in anyway and in the strangest places. As much as the world might try, you can't have Christmas without Jesus.

You'd miss it if you weren't looking for it. In the Patrick Stewart version, after Ebenezer wakes up and buys the turkey for Bob Cratchit, he hears singing. It's Christmas morning and people are in church celebrating the Christ Mass. And so, he goes in and joins in with the congregational singing. And there he hears the Good News, the Gospel, of Christmas:

God rest ye merry, gentlemen.

For Jesus Christ our savior was born upon this day.

To save us all from Satan's power when we were gone astray.

O Tidings of Comfort and Joy, Comfort and Joy. O Tidings of Comfort and Joy.

Dickens wrote "A Christmas Carol" in 1843. The world was trying to have Christmas without Jesus even then. Nothing has changed much since. The secular world would have us focus our Christmas attention on the presents, the decorations, and the food. Even the word "Christmas" is offensive to some. Some people get very uncomfortable if you say to them, "Merry Christmas."

But try as they might, you can't have Christmas without Jesus. And that's because we Christians are proclaiming the birth of our Savior. We sing so loud that they can't help but hear us. That's why we joyfully celebrate the birth of Jesus. And in Jesus Christ, God has blessed us, everyone.

"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit." — Romans 15:13





Operation Christmas Child: Where Your Shoebox Goes

Every year, our church joins millions of believers worldwide in packing shoeboxes for **Operation Christmas Child**, a ministry of Samaritan's Purse. These simple gifts—filled with toys, school supplies, and hygiene items—carry the love of Christ to children in need across the globe.

What Happens to Your Shoebox?

- Collection: Families and groups pack shoeboxes with personal gifts.
- **Processing Centers:** Volunteers carefully inspect each box to ensure items are safe and meet customs regulations.
 - Prohibited items (like liquids, food, or war-related toys) are removed.
 - If something is taken out, a small replacement item may be added so the box remains full.
- **Shipping:** Shoeboxes are sealed and shipped to more than 100 countries.
- **Distribution:** Local churches and ministry partners hand-deliver each shoebox to children, sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Clearing Up a Common Myth

• Some online videos have suggested shoeboxes are "dumped out and repacked." This is **not true**. Each shoebox remains intact as packed by the donor. Only unsafe items are removed, and the rest of your gift is delivered just as you prepared it.

Samaritan's Purse is *not* a Baptist church organization. It is a nondenominational evangelical Christian humanitarian aid ministry.

What Samaritan's Purse Is

- Founded in 1970 by Bob Pierce, later led by Franklin Graham (son of Billy Graham).
- **Mission:** To provide spiritual and physical aid to victims of war, natural disasters, disease, famine, poverty, and persecution worldwide.
- Nature: It is a faith-based humanitarian organization, not a church denomination.
- Affiliation: While Franklin Graham is associated with the evangelical tradition, Samaritan's Purse itself is nondenominational — meaning it is not tied to Baptist, Methodist, Catholic, or any single denomination.
